## **UPDATE ON FEDERAL FUNDING**

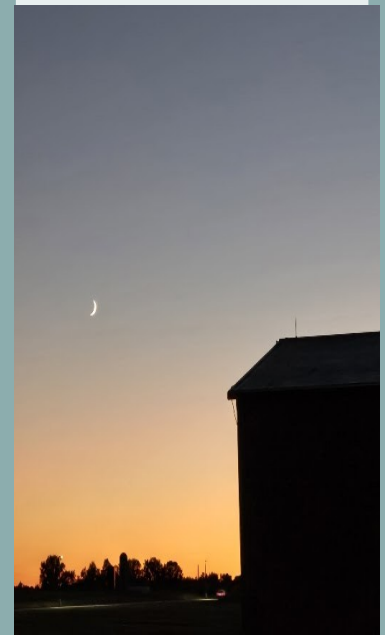
Since January, our Board of Supervisors and Staff have met the challenge of a Federal hold on nearly \$400,000. These funds — in varying time frames — have been restored to our budget and allow the ongoing operations of the District. We have adopted notable changes in focus because of the future potential for limits on our work, but we are stalwart to maintain our mission: to promote the wise use of soil, water, and related natural resources.

# NEW LOCATION: USDA Service Center moves to Dupont Hospital complex

On September 22, 2024, the Allen County SWCD moved from North Coldwater Road (Watermark Complex) to newly renovated facilities at 2720 Dupont Commerce Court.

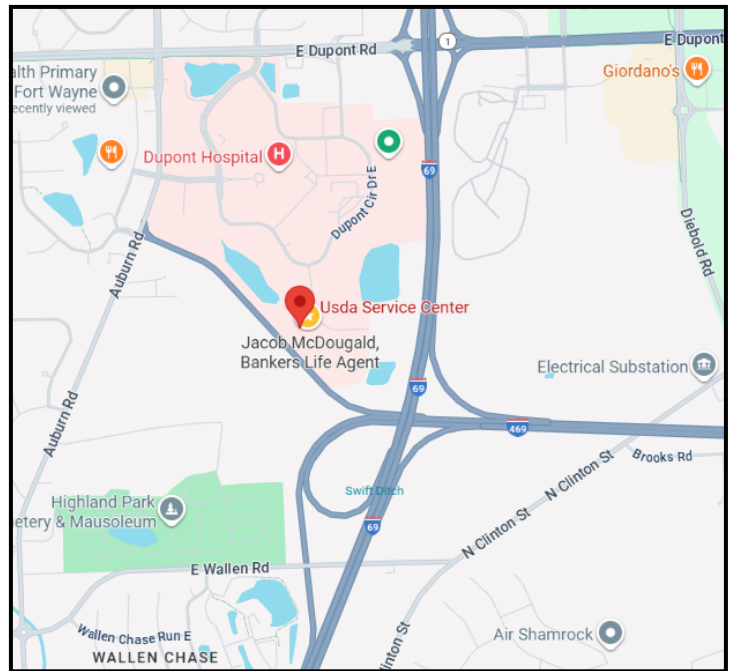
While we are a County agency, we are “affiliates” of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) which is part of the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). They host us in their space due to the agreements that we complete for these Federal agencies. Both SWCD and NRCS are housed within the Fort Wayne Area Office with FSA (Farm Service Agency), plus IASWCD representatives, and

ISDA (IN State Department of Agriculture) Resource Specialists (RS). The most difficult parts of the move: 2 months without furniture and 6 months without telephones.

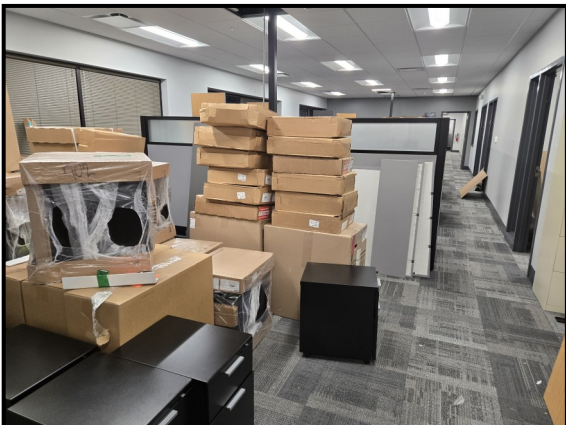
**THANK YOU ALL for your patience as we adjusted to these challenges.**

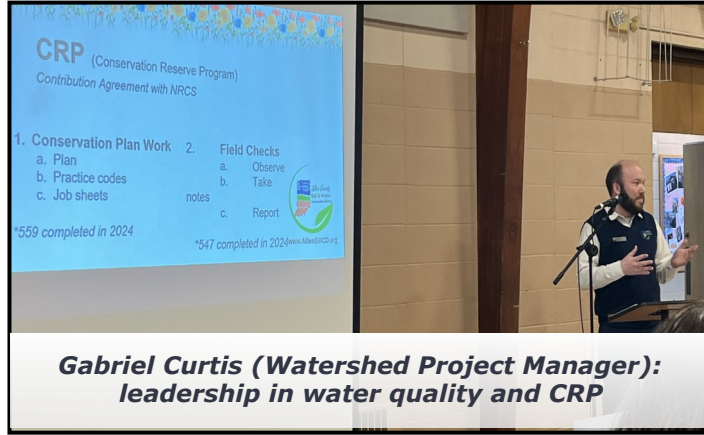

## COMPOST MIXER: A one-of-a-kind event and experience!

The Healthy Soils Collaborative, with leadership by **Elyssa Lewis**, Watershed Project Manager, assembled a magical event in late October. This collaborative was formed as a grass-roots movement to address issues with soil health. With ample support from Urban Soil Health (USH, which is a division of Indiana Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts), Allen Co. SWCD partnered with **Dirt Wain** and **Wood Farms** to bring an exciting event focused on COMPOST to southwest Allen County. The evening event featured two primary speakers on soil health (Terri Theisen, MS, USH) and benefits of composting (Brett Bloom, CEO, Dirt Wain). Demonstrations included diverse methods of composting, uses of compost, compost sifting, and large-scale production facility at Wood Farms. Bravas Food truck and eco-focused vendors were huge hits.

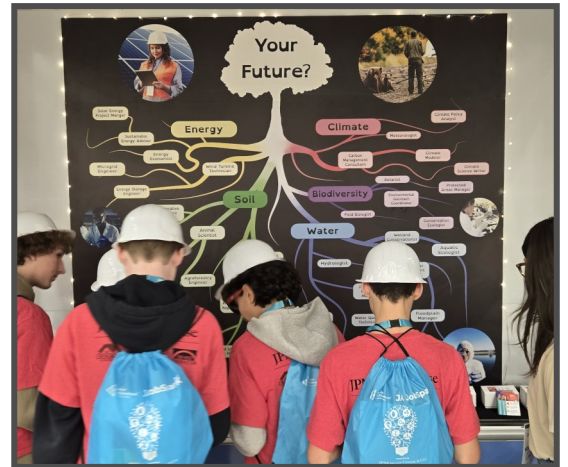

On November 13-14, 2024, the local Junior Achievement hosted "Job Spark", a massive career event aimed at thousands of high school students in the tristate area to aid their career planning. **Rhiannon Lake** led the District's participation in both 2023 and 2024 with great success. Over 8,000 students converged to visit careers from construction to health-care. Our Education Trailer was a hit with all four stations fully functional plus a 5th station on Drone Gaming (led by Rhiannon)! What a great experience for young people to be exposed to the world of agriculture and conservation as they are planning their schooling and careers.



### **ALLEN COUNTY GOVERNMENT UPDATE**

At a recent Allen County Executives Quarterly Meeting, Director Julie Good saw more of the results from the Indiana General Assembly that impact soil, water, and related natural resources. Both House SB 4 (Water Utilities) and HB 1037 (Stormwater Management) passed, dictating regulation at the State level that supersedes local control. SB 477 passed also and eases removal of low-head dams. As we assemble our 2026 County Budget, we are mindful that financial impacts to our local government will hit hard in 2027.

SWCD was pleased to offer the first "walking job fair" for attendees to find companies who were actively hiring. Another change was the location of the District booth, partnered with FSA, NRCS, ISDA, and other Conservation Partners. We moved into the Main Exhibit Hall, and plan to stay for next year's event. This new salary line—funded by your generous tax money—brings immense stability and effectiveness to the work of the District and confirms Allen County’s investment in agriculture.

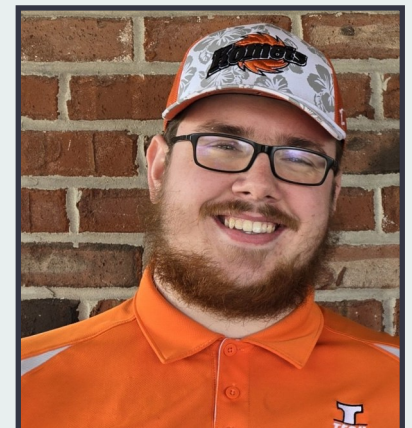
## **EDUCATION FOR CONSERVATION**

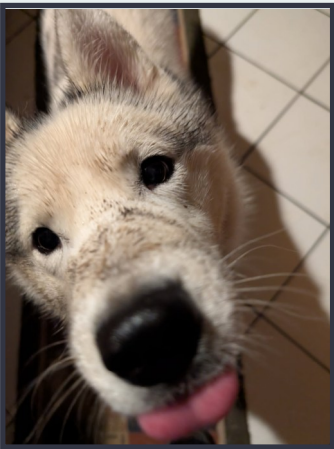
**NEW OFFICE

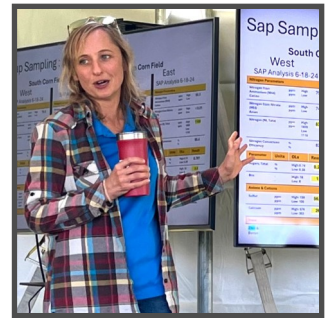
